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ABOUT US

Reconciliation Western Australia's (RWA) vision is to create a better future for our First Peoples and the wider Western Australian community.

RWA is a not-for-profit organisation, established in 2013 with purpose to provide leadership, advocacy and support to people and organisations driving the movement for reconciliation in Western Australia.

RWA engages the broader community of Western Australian in the journey of reconciliation. A positive consequence of that journey is to create pride and respect in our First Peoples culture and contribution whilst assisting them to achieve social and economic parity.

RWA is a key player in implementing a range of initiatives that progress reconciliation outcomes for Western Australia. The key to our success and to achieve these goals is through collaborative partnerships across corporate, government and community sectors.

RWA has strong established relationships with the Australian Reconciliation Network (ARN), which is formed by Reconciliation Australia and the other State based secretariats.

The ARN drive the National and State reconciliation agenda and work to foster collaborative efforts across all sectors of the Community. Within our own State, RWA work towards the five inter-related dimensions of reconciliation; Unity, Race Relations, Equality & Equity, Institutional Integrity and Historical Acceptance.

To facilitate a reconciled Western Australia, RWA's Board commissioned 11 goals which serve these five dimensions of reconciliation and our own best practise standards to attain sound governance moving ahead into our 2018 – 2021 Business Plan.

Through Relationships, Respect and Opportunities with our First Peoples, we build a stronger Western Australia.

Reconciliation WA (“RWA”), whilst still considered youthful in its tenure, has enjoyed a very busy and formative 2017.

During the year, we have turned our attention to the future. The development of a 4 year business strategy, supported by a business plan for our operations, will be a key guide for us in the years ahead, given the immense and broad agenda that is posed by the worthy aspiration of Reconciliation.

This year has been marked by the anniversaries of so many pivotal achievements and acknowledgements for the reconciliation movement and its drive to ensure parity and equity with our First People.

Reconciliation WA (RWA) has been instrumental in providing opportunity for the Western Australian community to engage powerfully with these anniversaries – to respect their impact and acknowledge the work still ahead to address the challenges and barriers in our State.

It is with clarity and purpose that RWA moves into the new year. RWA's Board and Executive will shortly launch our second Business Plan with our revitalised brand, messaging and communications strategy and website. Our team will be announcing exciting new partnerships which will value add to our reach and membership value proposition significantly.

My key highlight this year was during the Run for Reconciliation project - meeting two young Yamitji girls (6 and 4 and a half respectively) completing the 12 km run. Their 18 month old sister was in a pram beside them, being pushed along by their foster parents: "It's a team game and our collective effort will get us to the finish line, when we get there!" said their foster dad. What a powerful statement from such a courageous young family - so aligned with our movement – a story of hope and aspiration that is demonstrating the positive change now shaping a

better future – towards a WA which celebrates with pride and respect the culture and contribution of our First People.

Our member base grew significantly over this past year – we have had strong support from the Corporate and Community sector and are now focusing our efforts to grow the number of State and Local Government members. For your part in this, I want to thank you; our members and stakeholders, that travel this journey with us. For that invite you give us into your community to work with you, your family, your teachers, your council, your workplaces to build the champions of tomorrow that will enable this important movement to punch above its weight; driving reconciliation in WA. Your investment in us makes all of this possible.

This work could not have been done without a committed and able team. It is with a big and full heart, that I thank the Board and staff of the Association for their effort, at times, well above and beyond the call of duty – it is their professionalism, creativity and passion to see a better future for

2016/17 HIGHLIGHTS

There has been significant milestones and anniversaries over the past 12 months. This has given us plenty of opportunity to celebrate, respect, mourn, aspire and hope. We did this by collaborating with you. Following are some of our reflections:



SORRY DAY 20TH ANNIVERSARY

Reconciliation WA in partnership with the Bringing Them Home Committee hosted Australia's largest Sorry Day experience. This year respected the 20th Anniversary of the tabling of the Bringing Them Home Report to Parliament. The event hosted 2000 students and 1500 members of the community in a day consisting of entertainment, cultural activities and healing opportunities, with the highlight being the performance from famous Indigenous songwriter Archie Roach.

It is an important day of healing for many of our First People who belong to the Stolen Generations and their families who were consequently impacted by this trauma. It is an opportunity for all to not only understand the significance of such a commemoration but to also foster relationships, build respect and create opportunities of reconciliation between themselves and our First Australians.

NATIONAL RECONCILIATION WEEK

Between 27th May and 3rd June each year National Reconciliation Week (NRW) presents opportunity to build on the respectful relationships shared between our First People and all other Australians.

Core to our purpose is the engagement of NRW, with five significant anniversaries in 2017:



RECONCILIATION BREAKFAST

In line with the NRW message of “Let’s Take the Next Steps Together”, RWA hosted high-profile event targeting leaders from all walks of the Western Australian community. The 250 attendees were challenged to engage more deeply in the reconciliation movement and to champion this through their respective communities. The breakfast consisted of inspiring and insightful speeches and a panel discussion from prominent authorities who contribute significant leadership and passion to state and national matters of reconciliation importance.

TERRACE WALK FOR RECONCILIATION

The Inaugural Terrace Walk for Reconciliation commenced from Stirling Gardens, and concluded at Government House in Perth's central business district. It offered a fantastic conclusion to a meaningful day of events, with 1000 people participating during their lunch break to demonstrate the strength and appetite of the reconciliation movement in the state.

Dr Richard Walley OAM led an amazing display of significant cultural performances. A raft of powerful messages from joint Director of the Recognise campaign Mark Yettica Paulson and RWA Co-Chairs Gary Smith and Carol Innes marked a great event which will form part of RWA's annual calendar. We would like to thank Rio Tinto, BHP and Woodside who helped to make the event possible.



LEADERSHIP IN RECONCILIATION PROJECT



The Leadership in Reconciliation Project brings together leaders from across the Western Australian community to explore ways to work towards and achieve a reconciled Western Australia. Six groups of leaders were identified; Corporate, Community, Education, Government, First People and Young & Emerging Leaders. Over the past year 4 of the 6 groups have met and convened with the RWA Board and Executive to explore challenges, barriers and successes to reconciliation in their sector and share stories of hope and aspiration to shape the direction of the movement in WA moving forwards. A symposium will be held in the 2017/18 financial year, where the six groups of leaders will meet to explore how we can target our efforts to maximise our collective impact for the movement and enlist the broader Western Australian reconciliation community.

YOKAI ABORIGINAL EMPLOYMENT & RETENTION AND SUPPLY & PROCUREMENT FORUM

'Yokai' is a well established bi-monthly forum exploring the challenges, successes and barriers to addressing the economic disadvantage of our First Peoples. It brings together over 140 organisations from across all sectors of the community, and business interested in sharing learned lessons.

These organisations can apply these lessons and succeed more swiftly to achieve our shared vision and purpose of social and economic parity for our First People, enabling them to participate fully in the Western Australian Economy.

RECOGNISE AND THE ULURU STATEMENT FROM THE HEART

Following the 2017 National Constitutional Convention held in Uluru, the Referendum Council tabled the Uluru Statement from the Heart to Federal Parliament. A collective First People's vision seeking a voice to parliament to empower self-determination and positive change.

This voice, a tabled report to Parliament, has led to the Recognise campaign completing its efforts and being amalgamated into Reconciliation Australia. As such, the Recognise Campaign has now ceased.

Moving forwards, RWA believe achieving this is central to our shared journey of hope and aspiration as Western Australians. We must work with purpose and solidarity to support this voice in the face of an Australia which has a seemingly stifled appetite to achieve the stated intent.

Our close partnerships in the community are essential if we are to have a truly reconciled Western Australia built from relationships, respect and opportunities.

The statement reads as follows:

ULURU STATEMENT FROM THE HEART

We, gathered at the 2017 National Constitutional Convention, coming from all points of the southern sky, make this statement from the heart:

Our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander tribes were the first sovereign Nations of the Australian continent and its adjacent islands, and possessed it under our own laws and customs. This our ancestors did, according to the reckoning of our culture, from the Creation, according to the common law from ‘time immemorial’, and according to science more than 60,000 years ago.

This sovereignty is a *spiritual notion: the ancestral tie between the land, or ‘mother nature’, and the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples who were born therefrom, remain attached thereto, and must one day return thither to be united with our ancestors. This link is the basis of the ownership of the soil, or better, of sovereignty.* It has never been ceded or extinguished, and co-exists with the sovereignty of the Crown.

How could it be otherwise? That peoples possessed a land for sixty millennia and this sacred link disappears from world history in merely the last two hundred years?

With substantive constitutional change and structural reform, we believe this ancient sovereignty can shine through as a fuller expression of Australia’s nationhood.

Proportionally, we are the most incarcerated people on the planet. We are not an innately criminal people. Our children are alienated from their families at unprecedented rates. This cannot be because we have no love for them. And our youth languish in detention in obscene numbers. They should be our hope for the future.

These dimensions of our crisis tell plainly the structural nature of our problem. This is *the torment of our powerlessness.*

We seek constitutional reforms to empower our people and take *a rightful place* in our own country. When we have power over our destiny our children will flourish. They will walk in two worlds and their culture will be a gift to their country.

We call for the establishment of a First Nations Voice enshrined in the Constitution.

Makarrata is the culmination of our agenda: *the coming together after a struggle.* It captures our aspirations for a fair and truthful relationship with the people of Australia and a better future for our children based on justice and self-determination.

We seek a Makarrata Commission to supervise a process of agreement-making between governments and First Nations and truth-telling about our history.

In 1967 we were counted, in 2017 we seek to be heard. We leave base camp and start our trek across this vast country. We invite you to walk with us in a movement of the Australian people for a better future.

DRIVING WESTERN AUSTRALIA FORWARDS ON THE RECONCILIATION JOURNEY

Through our next Strategic Business Plan (2018-2021), RWA will invest in 4 program areas to effect meaningful and sustained reconciliation outcomes. This will be explored with you in detail early in the new year:

“Australian Truth (First Peoples true history), then justice should prevail. Without truth and justice, there will be no healing. Healing of all Australians is essential to reconciliation.”

The Cultural Equality Program will make Reconciliation information, including appropriate, localised First People's information available and accessible to the broader Western Australian Community. There are four projects which are central to the Cultural Equality Program-

1. Knowledge Clearing House
2. Story Telling
3. Wadjemup Project
4. Social Reinvestment

The purpose of this program is to raise the profile and engagement of government, corporate and community organisations in the reconciliation movement by empowering them to champion collective effort. RWA's advocacy and mentorship will expedite their success and achieve our shared vision and purpose. *The four Projects areas of this Program include:*

2. Leadership in Reconciliation,
3. Yokai First People's Employment, Retention, Supply & Procurement Forums
4. Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) Ready.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY 2016/17
